In old times, the first almanac was a chart showing the movements of the stars for a period of several years. Later almanacs were printed in a book form and included information which was especially useful to farmers. In the sixteenth century, almanacs began to be issued every year and included predictions of the weather. At about the same time, almanacs included calendars listing holidays. In the seventeenth century, almanacs included jokes. Benjamin Franklin continued this tradition with "Poor Richard's Almanac", which was published in 1732-1758. In Germany, the almanacs of the eighteenth century included poems by authors. The almanacs printed in the United States from 1835-1856 were called "Davy Crockett" almanacs. They were different from other almanacs, as they had many long tales.

Algebra, algorithm, quadratic equation, sine function ... just some of the terms of math which would not be known to us but for Al-Khwarizmi, an astronomer, geographer and founder of several branches and basic concepts of mathematics. In Geography he revised and corrected Ptolemy's view and produced the first map of the known world in 830 AD. He worked on measuring the volume and capacity of the earth, and contributed to work related to clocks, sundials and astrolabes. His full name is Abu Abdallah Muhammad ibn Musa Al-Khwarizmi. The last-mentioned name refers to his birthplace, Khwarizm, south of the Aral Sea. He was born around 780 in the town of Kath, part of Khwarizm. Kath is now buried in the sand. He died around 850. He was sent to Baghdad by Caliph Al-Ma'mun and appointed court astronomer. Algebra derived its name from the title of his work "Hisab Al-Jabr wal Muqabalah". Al-Khwarizmi emphasised that he had written his algebra book to serve the practical needs of the people concerning the matters of inheritance, law suits and commerce. He considered his work as worship to God.

A beetle is an insect with a hard covering on its body. Almost everyone has seen a beetle at some time in their lives. They often enter houses. Almost anywhere humans go, beetles can follow. There are more than 300,000 different kinds of beetles on Earth, and they all have some similarities. For example, all beetles have six legs and two antennae. And their bodies are divided into three parts. There are also differences among species of beetles. Some beetles, such as ladybugs can fly. Other species, such as the ironclad beetle, can only walk. Beetles also vary greatly in size. Some are about the size of a grain of sand. In contrast, titan beetles from South American rainforests can grow to more than 15 cm in length. Beetles have different ways of defending themselves. Bombardier beetles can spray a hot chemical to warn enemies. Acrobat beetles scare enemies by doing headstands. Still other types of beetles, such as leaf beetles, can hide themselves in their surroundings. Most beetles are helpful to humans. Ladybugs feed on pests that damage crops.
